INTRODUCTION (Sin and Repentance):

How do you define the doctrine of repentance?

The context of 2 Corinthians 7:9-11

- Timeline:
- Paul ended His second missionary journey; began his third and settled in Ephesus (Acts 19, AD 52/53).
- Paul wrote his first letter (lost) addressing sin issues (1 Corinthians 5:9 "I wrote you in my letter").

• Paul stayed in Corinth 18 months on his second missionary journey (Acts 18, AD 51).

- The Corinthians asked Paul clarifying questions.
- Paul wrote his second letter (1 Corinthians) to answer those questions (AD 55, from Ephesus).
- Paul learned of the false apostles at Corinth (2 Corinthians 11:12-13).
- Paul traveled to Corinth from Ephesus for a "painful visit," 2 Corinthians 2:1, and confronted the false teachers.
- The Corinthians did not stand with Paul before the false teachers (2 Corinthians 2:5-8; 7:12).
- Paul was grieved by the lack of support from the Corinthians.
- Paul wrote his third letter (lost), delivered by Titus, that caused sorrow for the Corinthians (2 Corinthians 2:4; 7:8).
- Paul was comforted by Titus' report (2 Corinthians 2:6-7; 7:15).
- Paul wrote his fourth letter, 2 Corinthians (late AD 55 or early 56).

8 Marks of Godly Repentance (7:9-11):

1.	Sorrow, 7:9-10 Biblical repentance requires a sorrow that is according to the will of God (2 Corinthians 7:9-10)
2.	Earnestness, 7:11 A persistent striving to correct a pattern of sin.
3.	Vindication, 7:11 A defense consisting primarily of the absence of the sin pattern.
4.	Indignation, 7:11 A feeling of anger over the decision to sin.
5.	Fear, 7:11 A healthy reverence for the One who is most offended by our sin.
6.	Longing, 7:11 A strong desire to restore the relationship that has been harmed because of sin.

8.	Avenging of wrong, 7:11 To apply a consequence that promotes holiness of life.
